TIBER BRIDGES



1 Ponte Milvio

(126 BC) This bridge played a strategic role in ancient times and was the northern gateway to the Cornelian head of Flaminius, Cassius, Salaria, Cloacina and Tiberina. It was also part of the Aurelian Wall fortification. The great battle of Basilica Nova (312 AD), a decisive victory for Constantine, and when Maximilian was killed on the bridge. The bridge has since been rebuilt and shortened when the last two spans were in 1830 by Valadier and in 1902 under Mussolini after Garibaldi had blown up part of it during the French invasion. Vehicular traffic was abolished in 1986.

2 Ponte Sisto o Auleo

(1586, Vincenzo Felloni, Antonio Aureli) From the Font Sisto, it spans across built under Maximilian, to the Lungotevere Flaminio. The bridge architecture, like the spans, is Feloni style—massive, classically inspired and pompous.

3 Ponte del Risanamento

(1875, Francesco Ferruccio) From viale Massimo Piazza Sisto Auleo and on to viale Sisto Auleo it passes the Villa Giulia Etruscan Museum. The Risanamento (Renaissance or Resurgence) Italy's 19th century nationalistic movement, led to the unification of the Italian states in 1870. Many of the Tiber bridges are named after the political leaders of the period including the three great names: Mazzini, Garibaldi, Cavour.

4 Ponte Malatesti

(1498, A. Antonelli) From Piazza Cinque Giornate to the Piazza Venezia, named after Giuseppe Mazzini, a popular Socialist politician, who was assassinated in London in 1872. The bridge was built at the beginning of the Unification era. The public had to be persuaded to step down almost everywhere. But in 1870, the bridge was built across down that abolished all remaining vestiges of absolutist government.

5 Ponte del Metropolitan

Rome's youngest bridge. It carries the subway to 12 stations on the Italian side of the Tiber.

6 Ponte Regina Margherita

From via Cola di Rienzo, a shopping street, on the Vatican side of the river to Piazza del Popolo, named for Queen Margherita who was only 18 when she married Italy's future King Umberto in 1896. As the de facto Queen, her father-in-law was a widower who came to Rome to grace state occasions. When she was widowed in 1929, she moved to Palazzo Margherita (now the American Embassy) where she continued her charitable works.

7 Ponte Cavour

(1867, A. Vassierini) From via Colonna to the Via Pace, named after Count Camillo Benso Cavour (1810-61) who was born in Turin, named Piedmont. He followed by the French revolution of 1830, he started a Risorgimento (the Reform or Resurgence) a newspaper in which he advocated a unified Italy with a constitutional monarchy. By 1848 a general frenzy for Constitutional Government broke out in Italy and throughout Europe. Rulers were forced to let their subjects form some sort of self-government. Cavour masterminded the whole Italian unification as the Prime Minister of Piedmont, but he didn't live to see his dream come wholly true. He died in 1861. He was the greatest figure of the Risorgimento movement which culminated in Italy's unification with the invasion of Rome in 1870.

8 Ponte Umberto I

(1895, Angelo Vescovali) From Palazzo della Giustizia to via Zanardelli and the Nazionale Museum (Condottieri). Umberto I was the second member from the royal Savoia family to become King of Italy. He came to power in 1878 when his father, Vittorio Emanuele II died and reigned until he was assassinated in 1900.

9 Ponte Sant'Angelo

(124 AD, Hadrian) Built by Emperor Hadrian to connect the city proper with his mausoleum (now Castel Sant'Angelo). After the bridge collapsed in the Holy Year of 1430, Pope Nicholas V rebuilt it, and the work honoring the three Roman Emperors was removed to provide easier access. Another notable event in the bridge's history was the execution of Beatrice Cenci. She and her mother and brother were imprisoned in the bridge's tower for 3 years after she killed her father, a cruel sadistic man who had imprisoned the family and tried to rape Beatrice. The entrance to the bridge was the site of her execution for the crime of parricide. In spite of its tragic history, this is the most beautiful of all the bridges. Beside and below the bridge, the 12 angel statues between 1588 and 1600, have great opportunity.

10 Ponte Vittorio Emanuele

(1877) Dedications from Carlo Vittorio Emanuele to his wife, Queen Victoria. Although Vittorio Emanuele I was King of the new State, Rome was to be named after his wife, Queen Victoria. When his arrival in Rome, he in 1870, he drove to his new residence at the Quirinal Palace. But the Pope, who had left only the day before, had locked the palace and taken the key. The king's wife had to ask a locksmith to break open the door. What an auspicious beginning for a new reign.

11 Ponte Nemorario

When it existed, this bridge was named for Nero who reigned from 54-68 AD. It spanned from Campidoglio to the bridge ground area between Corso Vittorio Emanuele and Piazza del Popolo to the Vatican residence (now the Hospital Santa Spirita in Sestini). Nero had his Circus built in the left of where St. Peter's Basilica now stands and needed a bridge to get there. The bridge fell down in the Middle Ages when there was a particularly high flood of the Tiber. One can still see the bridge foundations when the water level is low. The bridge was also called Ponte Vaticano.

12 Ponte Principe Amedeo di Savoia Auleo

Since 1901 spanning named for Prince Amedeo a member of the Savoia family from Piedmont. The bridge runs from the tunnel and Hospital Santa Spirita in Sestini to the Vatican side of the river to via Sisto and Corso Vittorio Emanuele in the other.

13 Ponte Medici

Since 1488 (century) From the Piazza Cavour just (Piazza Sisto) to Piazza Sisto on via Sisto (Piazza Sisto). Named after Giovanni Medici (1488-75), who named the Gariboldi, a secret society of artists. While imprisoned for his activities with the Gariboldi, he crystallized his decision to liberate Italy from foreign and domestic tyranny. From 1801 on, he led a wandering life, often in prison, and incited active revolutionary movements in Saragosa, Genoa and Savona. In 1808, he was one of the prisoners that administered Rome for the last time. He was a Republic (when the Pope fled during Garibaldi's abortive invasion). He wrote many reports on freedom as well as a letter urging Vittorio Emanuele to lead Italy to unity. In 1805, he was exiled to Genoa from Medici. In 1810, two years before his death, he saw his dream become a reality—Italy was a unified country, led by Vittorio Emanuele II.

14 Ponte Sisto (Ponte Auleo)

(160 or 16th century AD) Built during the late Roman Empire. After it was damaged in 753, Pope Sixtus III finally rebuilt it in preparation for Holy Year in 1475. It was subsequently renamed in his honor. Many Christian martyrs were driven from the bridge into the Tiber. Superstition has it that you can only have good luck if you see a white horse, an old woman and a priest crossing the bridge at the same time.

15 Ponte Garibaldi

Named after Giuseppe Garibaldi (1807-82) a patriot who worked for national unity. He defended Rome from the French when the Pope ran away in 1848.

TIBER BRIDGES

After several victories throughout Italy, the conquest of Rome remained the major obstacle to unification. In 1867 Italy's of Roman state (Pope or Queen) had unification as Cavour left the army wasn't right. Finally in 1870 he realized his dream of unifying Rome, but he was defeated by Papal troops who were the French, and then called by Cavour. But in 1870 he fought alongside the French against the Germans in the Franco-Prussian War. In July 1870, Rome was finally conquered, and by 31 December, Victor Emmanuel III Parliament had arrived in Rome to rule Italy.

16 Ponte Fabricius

(82 BC) This stone bridge that links the left bank to the island in the river preserved of the 19th century with much of its original structure still intact. In the Middle Ages it was also called Ponte Fabricius because of its proximity to the Quirinal. The present pavement was added in 1478 under Pope Sixtus IV. The original balustrade was bronze.

17 Ponte Cestivo (Cestivo)

(82 BC, Cestivo) Today it's called Ponte San Bartolomeo. It was the first stone bridge from the island to the right bank (Trastevere). The patricians had statues depicting the Emperors Fabius and Brutus who rebuilt the bridge in 359 AD. It was reinforced from the 15th to the 18th centuries at various times. When the embankments were constructed in 1858, part of the bridge was yet again rebuilt, carefully copying the old form.

18 Ponte Rotto (Ponte Aureo)

The construction of this bridge began in 175 BC by Publius Valerius and Aemilius Lepidus. Though the bridge had been made of wood, they used stone to build the piers making this the first bridge made of stone. Sulpicius and Minucius finished reconstruction with stone arches in 146 BC. Today it's called the Broken Bridge as only one arch remains.

19 Ponte Parione

This bridge stretches from Lungotevere Ripa to Lungotevere Flaminio and is to add right opposite the beautiful Pantheon of Forlano 2000. The view of Tiber island from the bridge makes you to see why the ancient Romans described it as the Isle of Sighs. The Ponte Parione can also be seen from the opposite bank. Cross to the other side of the river don't move you down—the especially careful as they are driving on the left hand side and walk down to the water's edge on your right at the 2000-year-old Piazza Navona, the large archway opening of an underground drainage canal. In 600 BC, this great Etruscan engineering feat—a highly decorative balustrade—was built up the Forum—diverted streams, which it built came to the river. The drain is still working well as it keeps the Forum.

20 Ponte Sublico

(c. 500 BC, King Anco Marcius) To cross the Tiber in Rome the Romans built the Sublico bridge on the right bank. The Etruscans on the right bank bridge no longer standing, it is said it could be quickly reconstructed the enemy. It is the most historically interesting bridge and the 2 companies against the Etruscans.

21 Ponte Aventino

From Piazza Portico to via di Sisto bridge also called Ponte Sublico really was located.

Ponte Caligula

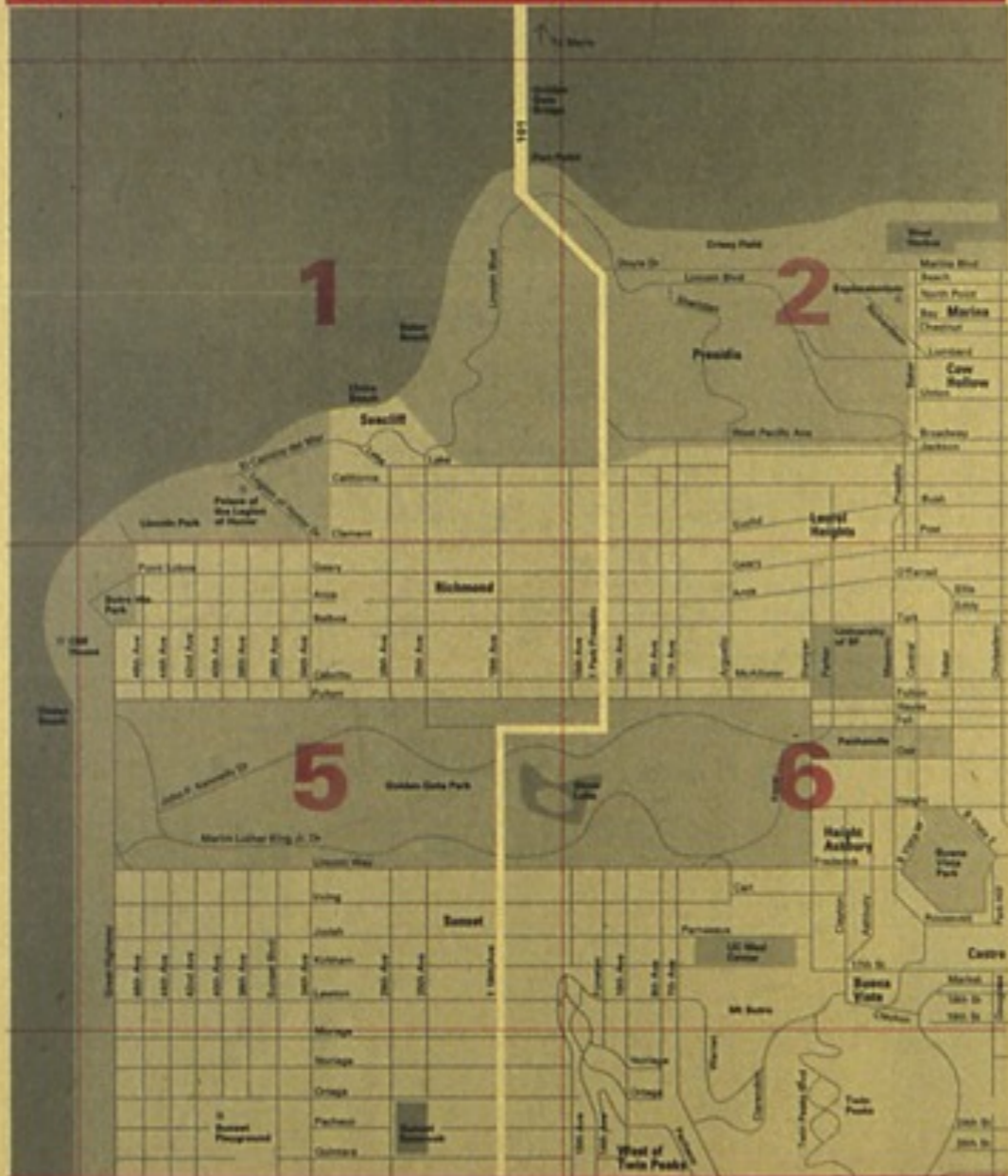
A lost bridge linking the Pylae with the most important place of Augustus on the Capitoline when Caligula was murdered.





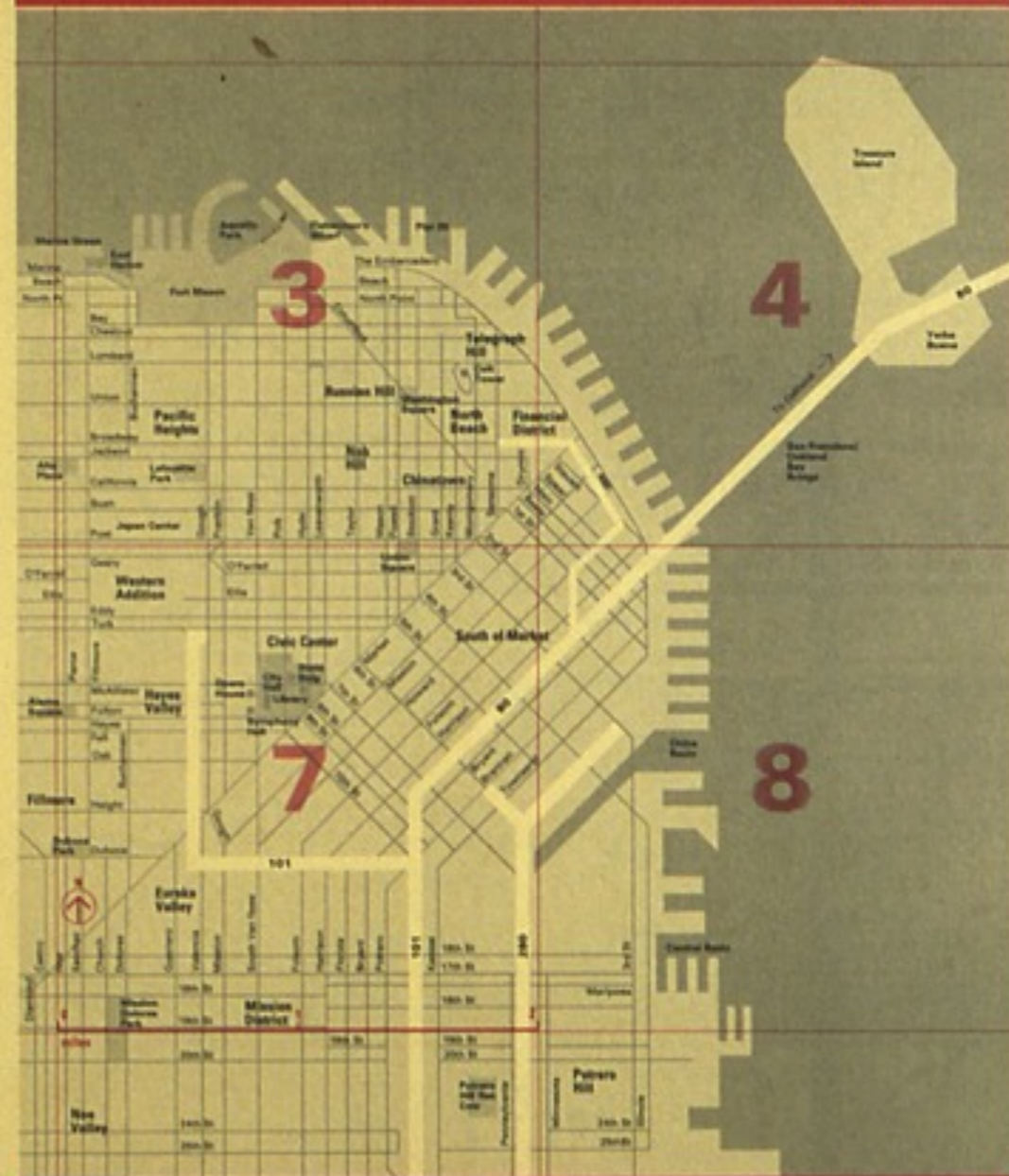


